Regional Oceania Concerns

Ongoing concerns for turtles

- The need for IUCN to reliably assess in some quantitative yet traditionally proper fashion the status and trends of the Regional and Regionally-linked populations.

Concerns for MTSG

- Establishing enhanced linkages and partnerships with SPREP local fishery and wildlife agencies, Conservation International and other appropriate entities for marine turtle conservation and sustainable use.
- Strengthening, merging and expanding cultural and traditional considerations for marine turtle conservation, concomitant with Western and Asian science.

Vision for Oceania

Prepared by Pacific Islanders at a 1996 SPREP meeting in Samoa

We see a future where generations of Pacific Island people will have choices about how they use and interact with sea turtles. This dream will come true if we take action now to ensure that sea turtle populations recover to become healthy, robust and stable. Sea turtles will be fulfilling their ecological role and be harvested by Pacific Islander people on a sustainable basis to meet their cultural, economic and nutritional needs.

Vision for Oceania

Translated into Solomon Islands Language and then back into English

It's not here yet, but we see a time when people in the Pacific and turtles are living together in harmony. The turtles will live to support the people in their needs; also turtles will have their place in the Pacific.

Vision pour l'Océanie

- New projects, opportunities

Resumption of SPREP's satellite tracking educational outreach and research project; Ongoing pelagic tracking and data analysis of juvenile loggerheads reared for research at L'Aquarium des Lagons in New Caledonia led by MTSG Richard Farman; participate in 2016 IUCN General Meeting in Hawaii.

- Selected notable activities

New Caledonia's construction of a captive breeding facility and Southern Province green turtle foraging ecology/cultural harvest study supervised by MTSG Richard Farman; Satellite tracking of rehabilitated turtles by MTSG Miri Tatarata and Te Mana o te Moana MTSG Cecile Gaspar in French Polynesia.

- Status, trends and genetic relatedness of populations both within and between Regions of the East Pacific, Oceania, Australasia, and East Asia .

Opportunities for MTSG involvement

- Appointment of Michael Donoghue to fill Lui Bell's position at SPREP; Investigate potential for hosting the ISTS in Oceania in 2018 or 2019.

- Potential funding sources

Utilization of past sources for future funding potential;
Investigate People's Republic of China for assistance to Fiji and certain other independent nations of Oceania;
Overseas assistance by France to French Territories of Oceania, and Australia, USA and New Zealand assistance to others.

Red List Assessments

- Species in need of IUCN Oceania regional assessments

Green turtles other than the Hawaiian Islands

- Status of regional assessments (ongoing support to global assessment processes, stand-alone assessments, etc)

Completion in July 2012 of Hawaiian Islands green turtle population assessment resulting in IUCN reclassification downgrading to Least Concern category led by Milani Chaloupka, Nick Pilcher, along with an assessment team of many other MTSG members.

- NOAA/FWS Status Review relevant to the U.S. Endangered Species Act completed in April 2015.

Networking & Regional Development

- Linkages between MTSG and other regional bodies (existing/proposed/possible)

Numerous linkages with continuing expansion;

- Support needed from IUCN and / or MTSG

Actively promote greater use of the MTSG ListServer through advocacy and example; Use IUCN global publicity avenues to give recognition to selected projects in Oceania, such as Cook Islands, New Caledonia, French Polynesia, Fiji and others; Convene a meeting of Vice Chairs possibly in New Caledonia or Hawaii to promote the expansion of MTSG Regional partnerships.
